We had five boats at Whiskeytown Lake with two of the boats having motor problems. Also at the Whiskeytown event, John Franz fell from a curb and is still recovering from a hurt ego and a badly skinned up right arm. I forgot exactly what he told me but, he fell several feet away from either coming or going near an outhouse. FISHING CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Greetings everyone.

Where is everyone? There were a lot of missing fisherman at our outing at New Melones. A few of you had boat problems and others had personal things that came up and could not attend. Rene and I were the only ones that put boats on the water that day. Rene had Brain Hough and John Berman aboard his boat. Rene beat out Brain by 1/100ths of ounce to take first place with a rainbow trout. Brain cut off the adipose fin on his kokanee to tell his from the other fish in the boat. He swears that made the all the difference in him not taking first place.

Ben's boat is 10/9 for now so he and his wife **Charlene** drove down to New Melones to cook and serve lunch for us. That was very nice of them to do that. It was a great lunch and **Ben's** potato salad was awesome.

I took **Steve Paulick** out in my boat. We had our share of problems that plagued our day. First thing **Steve** forgot his wallet and had to go home and retrieve it and then met me at the lake. My first rod in the water went overboard and sank out of site. When letting the downrigger down it pulled my rod out of the **untighten** rod holder taking it to 40 feet. Luckily it was still attached to the downrigger release and I was able to pull it back in. Not without pulling all the line off the reel until it reached the knot at the spool. We had one other problem. We didn't catch any fish that day.

New Melones and many of the lakes in the area are experiencing the same problem with inflow and debris into the lake. New Melones is rising a few inches per day bringing in lots of grass (straw) from the shoreline along with logs and branches into the lake. In the main channel the clarity of the water from the grass was so poor that your fish finders will not work. Both **Rene** and I have 2 fish finders that run separately of each other. They show you the bottom on the screen but when it comes to telling the depth it's anywhere from 0 to 30 feet when you know you

are in over 100 feet of water. Both fish finders will also read differently. One will say 30 feet and other one will read 0 feet. This also makes it almost impossible to locate the fish at times. You still can see your downrigger weights on the screen under the debris. When the wind picked up around noon the other day, the waves and white caps made the logs and branches disappear. So be careful when cruising the lakes.

At our next meeting you'll have to plan where to go. I will not be at the meeting and the first outing. So pick a good place to go. I hope to join you at our second outing on June 20th.


ACTIVITIES CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Whiskeytown, May 2023

This year we scheduled, what has turned in to our annual trip to fish for Kokanee at Whiskeytown, toward the middle of May. There were five boatloads of Jolly Hookers that made the trip. John and Jeff Kinslow, John Frantz and Sam Osuna, Ben LaSala and Steve Paulick, Robert and Walter VanHoy, and Wanda and Paul Wells. The weather turned out super, not too hot and not too cold, and the wind even cooperated.

You might ask, "Well, how about the fishing?" Yes, that is the question. Personally, Steve and I did not do that great, in my opinion. We caught very few fish the first couple of days, and I don't think we caught anything over 16 inches. The fish that we did catch looked fat and healthy. While Wanda drove the boat, Paul was able to boat a few kokes, but from what I understand, it was not red-hot fishing for them either. I think we all had, pretty much, the same experience including John and Jeff Kinslow as well as John and Sam, and Walter and his son, Robert. The kokanee had not schooled up; and they were very scattered.

I am not sure if this trip was ill fated from the beginning, but as I sit here writing this, I am starting to think so. If you remember, to begin with Ron Madsen, who was heading up this trip, had to go into the emergency room where he ended up with a 4-way by-pass.

As we headed in, our boat lost power and died. It would not turn over or start. "What the hell!" I ended up taking the trolling motor battery and switching it with our regular battery. (Steve Nelson thought we could carry a spare set of jumper cables in case something like this ever happens again.)

Fortunately, we were able to get the motor started. We kept our fingers crossed as we made our way back to the dock and got our boat back onto the trailer. It turns out that part of the voltage regulator's system burned-up.

In retrospect, the best part of this trip occurred on Wednesday night. We were all going to try to get together for dinner. Well, we did, just not in the manner we thought we would. We all ended up in John and Sam's room. Sam fixed me a Gin and tonic, which I had never had before. It was good, I liked it. We ended up ordering a couple of pizzas and sharing them. They hit the spot. That night, we all enjoyed each other's company.

New Bullards Bar, June 2, 2023

With the ignition module replaced (other than pulling the flywheel and price of the module, not a bad job) my brother Jeff and I decided to try for Kokes at New Bullards Bar: which neither one of had ever fished. We figured we could always stop at Collins if Bullards was a dude.

We launched at Dark Day about 6:30 and got off the water about 4:30 after cleaning two limits of Kokes. Jeff had his limit actually a couple of hours before I got my limit. Jeff had a lot better success with keeping his fish on than I did. I believe he had 2 that didn't make it to the boat to my 9 or 10 mainly on my second rod with a clip on weight. Most of the time taking the weight off created some slack and bye bye Koke. Once I started using a Brad's Koke Plug with a stinger treble hook I had much better results.

The Kokes we caught ranged from 10 to 12 inch and were around the 30-35 ft. depth trolling at 1.2 - 1.4.
